

# Community **Impact**

The Power of Collaboration

Clients from our Settlement team took part in a co-design research project to help shape parenting resources that better reflect the needs and experiences of diverse communities in Hamilton. Their voices and contributions were vital in creating inclusive and relevant resources for local families.



Partnerships like these have been key to our work. The team has also collaborated with organizations like Hamilton Public Library (HPL), Hamilton Community Legal Clinic (HCLC), Centre 3, Neighbour to Neighbour (N2N), local academic institutions, the Women's Centre, Grandmothers of Steel, WAWG members, CAPC, and numerous departments at the City of Hamilton.

# **Program Highlight:**



Our WorkLink programs continues to be a trusted pathway for clients to connect with meaningful work and navigate the Canadian workplace with confidence.

This year, the Worklink program delivered five full-time, in-person cohorts designed to help newcomers and job seekers build skills, gain certifications, and move closer to their employment goals. A total of 58 participants successfully completed the program—each one gaining practical tools and support to launch their careers.





# **Program Highlight:**



In the 2023–2024 school year, 103 students enrolled in the Academy Program —a unique initiative that supports learners in earning high school credits while simultaneously improving their English language skills. In-class PBLA assessments supported students in advancing their CLBs while earning high school credits in ESL, English, and Career Studies.

We offered five classes in both Term 1 and Term 2, providing consistent and targeted instruction. Notably, 46 students showed



CLB measurable progress, and students successfully graduated with Grade 12 English. In total, 83 students earned a high school credit, reflecting the program's continued success in integrating language development with academic achievement.



Thanks to the G12 English program, I was able to continue my studies at Mohawk College. Now in my second semester of the Business Accounting program, I am doing well in my courses and enjoying the opportunity to make new friends.

# Program Summary

Empowering Women through Crafting with "She Makes"

This year, the Community Connections department launched SheMakes—a program designed to support immigrant and racialized women in building financial independence through creativity and entrepreneurship.

Over three months, participants gain hands-on experience with Cricut technology to create custom products, while also learning essential business skills like marketing, budgeting, and digital literacy.



The SheMakes program is more than a training program. It builds confidence, connection, and a path to self-employment. With strong community interest, we're proud to continue welcoming new participants into future cohorts.


